Parish Council January 2019

Precept – The Parish Council have agreed the Precept Balancing Figure of £17056.37 for the financial year April 2019 to April 2020. This would mean an increase of £9.41 in total for a year as the Parish Councils proportion of the Council Tax on a Band D property. This would allow the Parish Council to retain the defibrillator, replace its IT equipment, refurbish the play area equipment, provide cricket nets on the Recreational area for the summer months, support the creation of a new parish plan and further support all the projects it wishes to complete in 2019/2020.

Community Grants – it was agreed to grant from the 2019/2020 budget £270.0 to the Mere Link Scheme, this would be presented at the May Annual Parish meeting. Further information was to be sought regarding the Village Halls Grant Application received, Council set the Community budget was set with regard to the support required by the Village Hall.

Highways - If any Parishioner sees or is aware of anything which they feel needs attention in and around the parish highways, they are requested to contact Wiltshire Council using either the online website above, the Wiltshire Council App or on the landline number **0300 456 0105**.

Traffic Report Maiden Bradley 15th January 2019

Speed Indicator Device

A trial took place from the 19th November to the 2nd December 2018 of the proposed replacement Speed Indicator device. Which has proved very successful and therefore this model has been purchased and will be put in place following the same process as the previous one. The device has the facility to download the number of vehicles and speeds passing the device and therefore gives the ability to place it where most needed at either end of the village.

Results Summery

- Total Vehicles counted over the trail period: 33,474
- Vehicles Over 30mph Limit: 1,978 (6%)
- Average Speed: 22.7mph
- 85th Percentile Speed: 27.7mph (The 85th percentile is the speed at which or below which 85% of the traffic is travelling)

There is no doubt that the Speed Indicator Device has a very positive effect on speeding generally and once received and set up will go a long way in reducing average speeding through the village. Volunteers to help move the SID would be very much appreciated.

Metro Count.

At long last we have the Metro Count figures for the Traffic Survey Results – Frome Road Maiden Bradley (30mphLimit)

Location North of High Street.

The results of the survey for Frome Road are as follows:

- The Survey was carried out between 21/11/2018 and 06/12/2018
- A total of 18741 vehicles were recorded
- The 85th Percentile was 38.59mph (The 85th percentile is the speed at which or below which 85% of the traffic is travelling)
- The Average speed was 33.7mph.

These figures clearly fit the criteria for Community Speed Watch based on the 85th percentile criteria for Posted 30mph Speed Limit 35.1mph to 41.9mph.

Therefore a request has been put forward requesting a list of training dates which will be sent out to all the volunteers who have waited so patiently to be advised of the dates and of course advised in the Parish Magazine for other parishioners who may wish to volunteer as well.

It has been a long wearisome period to get to this stage however we are starting to get to make progress.




Bee Keeping

Look too, treble is going -she's gone!

I record that my wife has been a bell ringer for a number of years and that means she is able to ring most of the six bells which hang in the belfry at All Saints Church as part of a Band, normally 6 ringers to make a tuneful tintin-nabulation from our tower. However some towers like St Michael's at Mere, have 8 Bells and a number of churches have 5 bells. Without exception our bells, tuned to perfection from Treble to Tenor, and with the experienced in charge, ring changes that have been composed centuries ago or indeed more recently by local ringers.

Rewinding to December 2017 Pat and I went to the bell ringers Christmas bash with many of the bell ringers from MB, Mere, Zeals , Bourton, Silton and Stourton attending. This was just one of many regular social functions, which happen around the District and at this event I was one of the few non-ringers having always believed that having one ringer in the household is enough. However on this occasion after a glass or two of wine and weakened by this largesse, agreed to start ringing and to go along to a lesson at Zeals parish church on Monday 7th January 2018. At Zeals the clappers that strike the bell are secured to mute the bell, thus allowing several learners to pull the ropes at the same time without making a noisy disturbance for the villagers.

On that first evening I met with three experienced teachers and a number of helpers and at my tender age of 70 launched into handling the bell rope and understanding the various parts of a bell's anatomy and learning to ring without making a sound. This I found to be first class upper body exercise and loosened up some of the joints and muscles which I had forgotten I had.

After several Monday sessions, I soon became familiar with the Fourth bell and started to understand where my position was in the scheme of things and not long into this training was ringing a bell at Stourton where I could actually hear what I was doing. The summer came and my confidence grew and now I am attached to All Saints at Maiden Bradley and that wonderful suite of bells and attend for the time being on Practice night and to meet some ringers who have rung for over 50 years. A yarn with Colin Dowson (a very experienced ringer) in the pub provides me with the encouragement and guidance that is needed as I draw on his years of experience.

Where does this lead? Well, during the year I was encouraged to register with the CCCBR whose campaign was to mark the 100 anniversary of the end of the First World War and during that conflict 1400 bell ringers who became soldiers fell in action and to mark their parting the plan was to recruit 1400 more ringers. This was achieved, and to date over 2400 recruits have been registered and I am proud to say that I was one of those recruits and that I

participated in the Ringing Remembers at 11:30 am at All Saints Church as did two other novice ringers.

Bell Ringing is a skill I have discovered and a skill which suits young and old boys or girls alike and it would be wonderful to have new faces turn up. I have now achieved 12 months as a novice Bell Ringer and can recommend this activity as worthwhile and most enjoyable.


From the Archive
