A BIRTHDAY TO REMEMBER

Following a number of cancellations due to bad weather and the 'virus' I managed to book a fishing trip out of Poole on 31st August (Fe's Birthday). I had been led to believe that it would be a simple day out for a spot of light fishing for Bream and Plaice. However, when we got on the boat the skipper informed us that we would be fishing over a reef and that we would need to use 2lb of lead in order to hold the bottom due to depth of water and strength of tide. Luckily the skipper had plenty of big leads on the boat as the heaviest lead I had was 8oz!

I was happy to start the morning with a 15lb Tope but the fishing dropped away as the tide slackened. The skipper worked hard to find the fish but there was no real fishy action until the afternoon. Up until this point Fe had caught nothing, so ignoring the skipper's advice, resorted to tactics of her own i.e. a 150lb trace line with the biggest hook she could find and baited it with a whole mackerel, a whole squid, a rag worm and a raw prawn – she had a few sideways glances from the 'experts' on the boat but they said nothing. Ten minutes later her rod tip bounced and line was stripped off her reel. After considerable effort trying to stay in contact with the fish the skipper managed to net a 35lb Tope – a PB.

Half an hour later something showed interest in the whole mackerel bait I had presented. I thought I had caught a medium sized tope but when the fish came close to the net the skipper informed me that it was a Bass. Trying hard to contain my excitement I managed to steer the fish to the net and was relieved when the 7.5lb fish was in the boat – another PB. The Tope safely returned to the water and the Bass was skilfully filleted and made for a tasty supper.

MAIDEN BRADLEY WEIGHTWATCHERS CAMPAIGN

Maiden Bradley Weightwatchers is a voluntary group set up to campaign against the HGV's who pass through our village, resulting in them being re-routed on to other roads.

An earlier incarnation of a similarly like minded group managed to get Wiltshire Council to impose a 7.5 ton weight limit on the B3092, but this has never been implemented.



A direct quote from Parvis Khansari, the Director of Highways and Environment at WCC, dated the 4th August 2020 in response to a letter sent by Weightwatchers is "in summary the council promoted an environmental weight limit in Maiden Bradley as part of a wider package of weight restrictions proposed for introduction across Western Wiltshire in 2011, but deferred implementation on safety grounds."

What this means is that they will take no action until the A350/A303 junction right turn is improved as part of the plan to upgrade the A303 following the formation of the Stonehenge Tunnel.

The tunnel has still not got planning permission and a decision is to be taken in November. If it is positive work will start in October 2021 and complete in October 2027. The improvement to the A303/A350 junction that we need to get the weight restriction which would divert HGVs out of our village would then complete in 2029/2030.

All this assumes that permission for the tunnel will be granted but recent archaeological discoveries may prevent this from happening.

So, the aim of our group is to lobby the necessary powers that be to try to make progress to implement the weight limit.

We have already written to the main companies who drive through the village and also County Councillors and the Director of Highways, and we are considering their replies before our next course of action.

What we need to do now is to firstly collect facts about our problem by doing surveys of the volume, time, and names of companies using the B3092. It has been recommended to us that we need 3 months of data to be able to have an arguable case, so we are proposing to do lorry counts and this is where you can help.

For an hour a day on different days of the week and at different times could you give up your time to help us survey on Church Street? We want to start the surveys in September and conclude at the end of November.

What is a Parish Council? Article addressing the request put by parishioners in the parish plan. submitted by Sarah Jeffries - Parish Clerk

A Local Council may consider any matter in which it has a statutory power to act including the power to spend an amount of money for any purpose which in the council's opinion is for the benefit for its area or its inhabitants. It is representative of the inhabitants and works in a transparent way. It works for its inhabitants and is accountable to the parishioners.

Working parties or 'task-and-finish' groups are occasionally set up by a Parish Council for a short-term purpose. They are not subject to the strict rules that apply to formal council meetings and do not need to be held in public. A working party cannot make a decision on behalf of the council, but they can explore options and present these to the council for a decision.

Where councillors, clerk, and chairman work together as a team they combine knowledge and skills to deliver real benefits to the community they serve. Good working relationships, mutual respect and an understanding of their different roles are vital.

The seven Nolan principles apply to the conduct of Councillors in public life. They are:

- Selflessness: you should act in the public interest
- *Integrity:* you should not put yourself under any obligations to others, allow them improperly to influence you or seek benefit for yourself, family, friends or close associates
- Objectivity: you should act impartially, fairly and on merit
- Accountability: you should be prepared to submit to public scrutiny necessary to ensure accountability
- **Openness:** you should be open and transparent in your actions and decisions unless there are clear and lawful reasons for non-disclosure
- Honesty: you should always be truthful
- *Leadership:* as a councillor, you should promote, support and exhibit high standards of conduct and be willing to challenge poor behaviour.

As I have no doubt many parishioners will have noticed that the Bus Shelter has been re-decorated. The work being carried out by 2 Councillors ably supported and helped by Carl Warner.



However during the process of re-decorating it became intolerable at times to continue because of the Dog Faeces bags being put into the bin that were rotting in the bin even though the bin is cleared by Wiltshire Council on a regular basis. This has led to a series of complaints, some written from parents who are delighted with the refurbished Bus Stop Shelter, however they are complaining bitterly about the appalling smell that comes from the litter bin because of the Dog Faeces being put into the litter bin by the bus shelter. Therefore this is a request of the Parish Council that Dog Faeces bags are not put into this litter bin for the foreseeable future as it is unfair to inflict the risk and foul smell on those, especially the children of our village, who use the bus stop.

There is an investigation being carried out by the Parish Council to establish the feasibility for an appropriate Brown Dog Faeces bin to be provided close by. In the meantime, PLEASE do not use the Bus Stop Litter Bin for the Dog Faeces bags.
