Ronnie De Renzy Channer Of Siggiewi Malta, and Maiden Bradley

Ronnie De Renzy Channer was born on 11 January 1939 in Bearsden, Glasgow, where his parents Nancy and Hugh were posted at the time with the Highland Light Infantry (HLI). After his father retired due to a wartime injury, Ronnie spent his childhood and youth on an apple farm in Suffolk with his three brothers, and sister. He was educated at St. Bede's Roman Catholic prep school, and then at Ampleforth College.

After school, Ronnie went to Sandhurst and followed his father into the HLI – he was one of the last two officers commissioned into this regiment. A month later, the HLI became the Royal Highland Fusiliers, and this regiment was to be Ronnie's home throughout his military career. His military service included postings in Scotland, England, Northern Ireland, Germany, and Belgium, as well as Aden (now Yemen), Malta, Singapore, and Colombia.

Ronnie met Esme in 1961 in Malta and they married in Valetta in September 1962, although by the military regulations of that time he was too young and required special permission.

Ronnie and Esme moved homes 23 times during their marriage, and brought up five children, Nicholas, Dominic, Richard, Francesca, and Alexandra.

When he retired from the army in 1990, Ronnie and Esme moved to Wem, in Shropshire, where they ran the boarding house of Adam's School, one of the few state-run boarding houses in the country. On discovering that the school had an ancient connection to the Drapers Company, Ronnie approached the guild and was successful in encouraging them to support the school. This was the start of a close relationship, which resulted in the Drapers' later inviting Ronnie to become a Draper himself.

In 2000, Ronnie and Esme retired to Malta where they lived very happily in the village of Siggiewi. Ronnie took up painting, which brought him great joy, became an expert at maintaining stone walls, and volunteered with the Maltese heritage charity, Din L'Art Helwja.

In 2011, Ronnie had a life-changing operation for jaw cancer and in 2017, he suffered the first major stroke which marked the beginning of vascular dementia.

In March 2018, Ronnie and Esme returned to the UK to the village of Maiden Bradley, where Ronnie spent a very happy last few years, determinedly walking around the village, and enjoying the view of the trees and hills from the bench on Back Lane.

Ronnie died on Wednesday 7 July 2021. He leaves behind him his loving wife Esme, his five children, ten grandchildren, and great granddaughter Eliza, who was born just before Ronnie died. He is sorely missed.



"All art was once contemporary"

The essence of the exhibition "Continuities", as presented at The Old Chapel, Maiden Bradley, in association with Paul Hughes Fine Arts, originated from living artists within our constellation who share a passion for that mystical otherworldliness in art and to enter into a dialogue with our museum quality collection of ancient Andean Pre-Colombian archaeological textiles.

"Continuities" is intended to illustrate how works from different periods and cultures are visually interwoven despite their diverse chronological and geographical background, whether it is an affinity in aesthetics or intentionality imbued within the living artist's creations.

Exhibition content to include the works of Annie and Josef Albers, Lawrence Calver, Paul Hughes collection, Ptolemy Mann, Fionna Curran, Ben Hughes, Maria Simonds-Gooding, Augusto Ballardo and Katharine Swailes.

Continuities will enable us to compare artworks, providing us new and fresh perspectives, allowing us a new way of looking at events, situations, and peoples. By analysing artworks from the past and looking at their details, we can rewind time and experience what a time period different from our own was like and how artist today are inspired by the past.

The living artists and we believe, that such a project presents ancient art more intimately and art history becomes more accessible, less of a place where you are told a truth that you have to learn and more of an immersive experience that you grow with, updating the visual language of the historical in alignment with contemporary practice, interpretations and parallels.

What is fascinating about the arts is that by changing the context we redefine the objects and allow new meanings across time within a visual span of confluences spanning 2000 years.

Ancient Andean textiles played a pivotal role in the development of the works of Josef and Anni Albers at The Bauhaus, and following on to their teaching practice at both the Black Mountain College and Yale school of art, "Continuities" will highlight that early 20th century confluence up to the present day as presented by the works of the participating living artists. The Albers' felt a complete emotional camaraderie with anonymous Andean weavers whose names they would never know, some of whom lived many centuries ago, because of a shared interest in line and colour and artistic technique, and a mutual feeling for the joy and emotional well-being covered by these visual interactions and experiences.

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COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH NEWS

Police Community Volunteers working on behalf of the Wiltshire Police and Maiden Bradley



Welcome to Community Speed Watch News, July Issue, compiled and produced by the Maiden Bradley Community Speed Watch Volunteers to keep the village aware of our activities.

Activity has been as usual this month with 9 sessions to date with 1782 vehicles counted and 135 vehicles logged for speeding. The problem area, Frome Road (B3092) remains the same if anything the average speed has increased, so has the aggression. The doubling of CSW activity on the B3092 is having a positive effect, however at the expense of Church Street where it was noted by the SID that a vehicle approached the traffic calming at 47mph. Unfortunately the registration No was not noted.

Sharing the speed device with the Deverills CSW team on a week on week off basis. Is certainly working well. working very well. If Maiden Bradley doesn't get you the Deverills will!!! They tell me that they caught one vehicle doing 39mph going one way, 15 minutes later they caught the same vehicle doing 38mph going in the opposite direction. I guess for some it's a very slow learning curve.

The very good news is that we are getting Police support for both Maiden Bradley and the Deverills Between 27th July and the 6th August. Should be good.

SID. The Speed Indicator Device as always has a very positive effect. If you see an incident Call 999 if the driver is still on scene, or 101. Take the Reg. No.

Thank you for all your support in the CSW activities and for your support in the future. However we do need more support as we plan to increase our activity. So please come forward and help. Full training is given and you get a smart Yellow Tabart and an Authority card. An hour a week is the average time spent by a CSW member. Just telephone 01985 844848 and we will do the rest.

Anyone for Fishing?

Once again Adi Roche and James Kennedy are planning a day's sea fishing. Our audience are MB villagers that might like to give sea fishing from a boat a try, ideal for absolute beginners, and those who have fished in a lake or river and want to try something different.

The vessel Silver Spray II a modern twin hulled powerful fishing boat designed for the rod and line angler. A state of the art boat with all the most modern aids for fishing, lifesaving, with a loo and other facilities. Our skipper will be an experienced mariner and fisherman and a member of the Cummins family who will take us out for the day and conduct our search for fish.

It's a full day out but weather dependent and we leave MB rendezvous (RV) at about 05:30 arriving at our second RV MacDonald's just outside Poole at about 06:30. This allows us to have a coffee maybe breakfast, meet the others on the trip and convoy drive into Poole Old Quay - being a desirable way to keep folk together for finding the carpark and meeting the boat.

We should be on the quay between 07:30 and 08:45 for boarding. We will be met by Andy or Sam and receive a safety briefing.

Regarding fishing gear, within the price of £60 payable in advance to the organiser. You will receive the use of a rod, reel, all tackle and bait for the day any breakages you will need to be responsible for and agree a price and pay the skipper. There will be three experienced anglers on board, to help you bait hooks and play and land fish, hopefully making your day as productive and exciting as possible.

As we will have a full boat we will be running a competition, a winners trophy, for boys and girls, the most species caught, largest number of fish caught and the biggest fish of the day. By the way a 30lb Tope may not be big enough!



After departing the Quay, we will head out of the harbour to our first mark, which may possibly be for mackerel bait and eating.

We may head toward the Isle of White for Bream or the Dolphin Sand Banks for Plaice or maybe West to Swanage Bay. Whichever way, we may drift over our marks or anchor depending on the fish, the tide and the weather.

You will all catch something.

Returning to the Poole quay around 17:00. and then home to MB arriving between 18:30 and 19:00 for a well-earned drink at the Hare.

Interested then please drop us an email before 10th August and we will get back to you.

Spring Watch at 64 The Rank – Update

Last month we reported the late arrival of the Swifts, I am pleased to report they have arrived in strength during the past month and all 5 of our nesting sites are now occupied. We have noted that Barcroft is showing up on the Swift Mapper and we hope others of you will add more village sites to the local map:

My skill as a photographer does not allow me to take fast moving pictures that remain in focus but we shall try over the coming weeks to get some evidence for the record.

We have had the joy of a Song Thrush singing all day and up to dusk. No it is not a Nightingale, for those of you who are interested the Song Thrush has in my opinion a more varied song and a generally better voice and does -not sing during darkness. The Nightingale on the other hand is a migrant and generally arrives in spring and finds nesting in dense copse generally in the South East of England particularly Sussex and Kent and sings only at night. You can download their music from the Internet if you would like to listen.

The subject of the roadside verges has come into view mainly because this year they remain un-cut. As road user we are having to drive, ride and walk more carefully as the road is less well defined However, for the nature lover, leaving the verges to naturalise opens up opportunity for the birds and small rodents. However, we have noted earlier in the spring on the wayside Meadow Cranes-

> bill. Common Spotted Orchid and just here in Bradley Lane, Hedge Bedstraw and a big clump of Goats Beard.



Cutting to the chase; the mention of Giant Hogweed came onto the radar, as a result of the new verge cutting programme. Yes beware, please be careful of this plant and Hogweed the sap is highly aggressive and cause skin burns which result in running sores. History tells us that the use of Hogweed sap on the face of beggar children was in common use during Victorian times and produced the most horrific results but improved takings. Therefore when out walking in the country make sure legs are well covered to avoid contact with some of our common wayside and meadow plants.

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
