The Maiden Bradley Climate Collective

Activating Maiden Bradley's Environmental Response

On a cool, dark, wintry night last month a substantial crowd of people gathered at the Village Hall to listen to a presentation by alternative energy companies; Ecobubl and Daikin.

There was lots of useful information which I will try and summarise.

The key debate was:

Is it feasible to install alternative energy systems in our village and if so what are the costs and benefits.

YES!!

There are systems which can be retrofitted in older buildings without too much disruption or undue cost.

This is encouraging from the practical as well as the planning point of view as, despite what suppliers may have said in the past it seems that this kind of technology is now permitted in a conservation area or area of outstanding natural beauty unless your building is actually listed. Indeed, provided the appropriate planning permissions are applied for listed building can be included. This is a change from the past when listed buildings were simply not considered for such things as solar panels or double glazing. The team did stress the need to insulate buildings as much as possible which is another whole conversation!

We heard about grants for this kind of work.

The first grant is finishing at the end of March for £11,000 but homeowners have to find the cash upfront and then it is paid back to you over a number of years.

The second grant starts in April and although somewhat less at £5,000 it is an upfront sum that is paid to the installer and would probably cover around half the cost of an installation in an average house. With electricity prices soaring all these equations seem more attractive by the day!

The grants are relatively easy to procure and that ecobubl do the paperwork for you if you go through them.

Last but far from least ecobubl agreed to offer a discount if we could commission at least 5 systems in the village. That feels like a very manageable target for us and a real possibility that we might begin to relinquish our local dependency on oil.

The presenters also talked a bit about batteries and how they might be deployed so that any solar panel system could be made to function more smoothly.

They showed us an electric car charger which could be sited at Village Hall and thereby improve the feasibility of purchasing of electric vehicles for some.

We heard about varieties of air and ground source heat pumps that can connect up to radiator networks that are already in place.

There is a great deal to think about and January's meeting was really just the very beginning. We plan to have a second meeting at some point in March. If you can't wait that long ecobubl have a YouTube channel with some videos on it that talk about various things that they offer; you might want to look them up!

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ALL SAINTS BELLS AND TOWER NEWS



BELLS:

For those who have wondered and never asked, we have six bells in our tower the Heaviest Bell the Tenor weighs in at 13 Cwt 2 Quarters 7Lbs that's 1519 Lbs or 690 Kgs and tuned to F. The Tenor bell makes that lovely Bong and is the time keeper when we are ringing. The bells all have names and they get smaller and the lightest bell is the Treble. Our bells were refitted back in 1993 and therefore the engineering is fairly modern but the bells themselves are quite old and they have a lovely mellow tone.

However things do wear out and we need to plan to replace the bell rope on our number 5 bell and indeed all our bells over the coming years so that we can ring for another decade.

I was asked the other day when did I start ringing bells, the enquirer was quite surprised when I said 2018 in my 71st year. So I know a bit about ringing. But we have a Bell Captain David Puckey, who has been ringing since he was 9 and learned his skills in Devon and Cornwall, Vice-Captain Pat who has rung for 11 years, Kate who has been ringing for 3 years and each have learned at MB and with the Mere group of tower ringers and Mike who has a good experience learned at the Minster. Are you going to join us and make our numbers up, its very good upper body exercise and we do go to the pub after practice which is on a Tuesday evening. Why don't you give it a try, give me a call 01985845397 or ping me an email 64therank@gmail.com we can't come to you but we can fix a convenient day and time to give you a taste of the bell ringing at All Saints.

THE CLOCK:

The clock had its blue face and gold finished hands refurbished last autumn and it looks grand. However, the clock has not run for four years and not chimed in recent history. We managed to remove the hundreds of cluster flies from their winter quarters in the clock cabinet and we have repaired the winding mechanism and removed much grime and grease from the mechanism itself, have set the clock in motion but the clock manages to lose an hour a day; however it is running. We suspect slipping escapement wheel may be the cause of the problem. However a thorough mechanism clean might help the problem and this maintenance may get the clock back into good time keeping.

FLAGS:

Maiden Bradley has in recent years become home for many flag poles, flags and masts. This year I hope we will see them all flying a suitable flag in respect of Queen Elizabeth's Platinum Jubilee.

Our highest mast is the one on the top of the tower at All Saints Church, which I am pleased to say has a sparkling new mast and currently flies a very old and damaged St George Cross flag which is now past further repair.

We need, in honour of Queen Elizabeth II accession to the throne 6th February, be flying the Union flag, and we don't have one.

In order to spruce up our flag etiquette, we need both a Union Flag and a St George flag to fly from the topmost point of our village. The flags will fly appropriately and proudly this year and we hope for a number years to come and the flags will be kept in the Bell Ringing chamber of the tower. Can you help us, we have raised £150 by donation and we need another £50 to cover the last part of the purchase. This breaks down to 4 people or families or groups affording £12.50 each.

The new flags have been ordered and we expect to be delivered by the end of the month and it would be helpful to have names of those willing to donate so that the flags can be paid for on delivery.

COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH NEWS

Police Community Volunteers working on behalf of
the Wiltshire Police and Maiden Bradley



Community Speed Watch News, January 2022, Compiled and produced by the Maiden Bradley Community Speed Watch Volunteers to keep the village safe and aware of our activities.

Activity in December has been very quiet for 3 sessions with 431 vehicles counted and 4 vehicles logged for speeding. The weather has had a very big effect on our activity. However the HGV traffic continues to increase, based on the numbers logged during CSW activity. During a 60 minute CSW session 18th January 2022 26 HGV vehicles of which 19 were directly related to the Quarry/Aggregate industry. An HGV every 2.3 minutes. Or 545 hgv tonnes per hour through our village. Also more HGV vehicles are either "32tonne 4 axle rigid vehicles or 44tonne 5 / 6 axle Articulated" With a maximum length of 16.5mtrs (54ft - 2ins)

Drawbar combinations are becoming more common. They are governed to the same GVW of 44000kg their overall length is greater at 18.5mtrs (61ft-6ins) makes them more difficult to manoeuvre through our roads and traffic calming.

Again all this information gets passed back to the Maiden Bradley Weight Watchers group, who are working so hard to get the 7.5gvw weight limit implemented.

Our meeting with Wiltshire Council Councillors and officers, due to be on the 17th December, was cancelled because of working from home restrictions for the council officers. We were offered a Zoom meeting but with the agreement of our partners from Corsley and Chapmanslade we decided to postpone the meeting as we would rather meet face to face to discuss our proposals. We are hoping for a date later in February to meet.

But, we are still working hard. Our chums from Community Speed Watch are noting the HGV axle configurations which gives us a close estimate of the weight of the HGV's. This is because anecdotal evidence is that the size of the HGV's has increased in recent years, so we need to get the actual data.

We are also doing some 24 hour monitoring sessions to get the numbers and names of the HGV operators by time, looking at those travelling at anti social hours especially during the night. This has just started in mid January.

We feel that we need to do this to get as much hard data as we can accumulate to back up our thoughts and then proposals to Wiltshire Council.

What is a councillor?

Councillors are elected to represent an individual geographical unit on the council, known as a ward or - parish – in Maiden Bradley it is the entire parish. They are generally elected by the public every four years, but there are 3 Co-option spaces available on the Parish Council at the moment.

What do councillors do?

Councillors have three main components to their work.

1. Decision making - Through meetings and attending committees with other elected members, councillors decide which activities to support, where money should be spent, what services should be delivered and what policies should be implemented.
2. Monitoring - Councillors make sure that their decisions lead to efficient and effective services by keeping an eye on how well things are working.
3. Getting involved locally - As local representatives, councillors have responsibilities towards their constituents and local organisations. These responsibilities and duties often depend on what the councillor wants to achieve and how much time is available, and may include:
 - Going to meetings of local organisations such as the Rural Police Neighbourhood Tasking Group
 - Going to meetings of bodies affecting the wider community (The Warminster Area Board)
 - Taking up issues on behalf of members of the public

How much time does it take up?

Quite often councillors say that their duties occupy them for about one hour to four hours a week. Obviously, there are some councillors who spend more time than this - and some less, but in the main, being a parish councillor is an enjoyable way of contributing to your community and helping to make it a better place to live and work. As a councillor representing your community you will help keep it a great place to live and work. You will be supported in your role and will be expected to undertake training. You should be comfortable working electronically. You should have a positive outlook and a can-do attitude and be willing to work as part of a team. If after reading this notice you are interested in applying, please contact the Clerk to the Council using the above details. The closing date for applications is 1st February 2022.

Planning Comments - PL/2021/08100 Site Address: Former Sydenhams Yard, Bradley Lane, Maiden Bradley, BA12 7JR. The Parish Council noted that the comment was to be made on the amendments only. Council informed the Clerk that it supported the revised application with the comment: The border should be kept alongside the footpath at the shop for aesthetics.

Area Board Finger Post Grant - It was agreed that the Knapp finger post is put forward for refurbishment. The Clerk was instructed to action the grant application to the Warminster Area Board for match funding.

Interpretation Board - It was agreed to let the wood go to its natural state of grey rather than maintain the wood every year, once a year.

Parishioner's request – A parishioner had asked the Parish Council to consider an application for a dog waste bin to be placed on back lane ideally as there are no bins anywhere near this popular walk.

The Clerk reported that she had received a guide price from Wiltshire Council, the cost of such a project would be £741.38 plus VAT for the Litter Bin and £195.00 plus VAT for a weekly collection service, a total of £889.65. It was agreed that this additional cost had not been budgeted for, so it was agreed to not move forward with the request, but it would move the request forward for consideration in the 2023/2024 budget. Unitary Councillor Bill Parks be thanked for his assistance in getting the quotation for the meeting.
