Whatever your tasks this month, the News Team, Elaine, Meg and myself, wish you all a very Happy Christmas.



Christmas opening hours this year will be; Sunday opening times on Christmas Eve and closed all day Christmas Day. Boxing Day will be normal Sunday hours.





Astronomer and Cranborne Chase AONB Dark Skies advisor Bob Mizon will regale the audience with stories of the astronomical wonders above their heads, while the AONB's director Linda Nunn will detail developments concerning the Cranborne Chase AONB's bid for prestigious International Dark Sky Reserve status. Afterwards, the audience will join Bob and members of the Wessex Astronomical Society outside for a spectacular stargazing experience.

Dog Walking

There are many of us in Maiden Bradley who own a dog and take the circular walk around the village at all times of the day, rarely meeting another dog with dog walker. However, recently a dog was attacked by another dog that was off the lead, causing injury and Vet bills.

Sometimes I have noticed little black bags, presumably with dog poo in them, left on posts or discarded in the verge. One has to ask the question, Why? Coloured dog poo bins are not provided by our Parish Council but there is a bin in the Hall

car park, one on the Recreation Ground and one by the village shop which serve the purpose.

We notice on our walks, litter, which we collect and put in a bag then the bin to try to keep our village as tidy as possible – perhaps other dog walkers could do the same?

The interesting thing about autumn is the slow change that occurs from summer starting in the middle of August, we see and hear changes going on which are quite fascinating. The Swifts

left early 11th August being a last sighting this year. The House Martins, finally lined up on the wires at the beginning of October and a couple of weeks later the Swallows followed them. The Swallow, this hardy high speed flyer covering up 200nm a day at about 50 mph, can still be seen in places like Cornwall, where they are now known to overwinter.

What's happening in the garden today, the Nuthatch is on our feeder and is now a frequent visitor, and the Coal Tit is busy on the feeders, as are the Blue and Great Tits. It won't be too not long now and we will see the Long Tailed Tits as routine regular visits normally arriving as a flock of 10 or more. A Sparrow Hawk followed his daily routine circuit of the gardens this morning

and helped himself to an unwary Blue Tit. The Red Kite family often in evidence overhead, however their young have probably been shooed now, as the couple are now flying without the family. Gold Finches are abundant and we have seen the odd visiting Green Finch. As I write this, a female Greater Spotted Woodpecker has spent most of the morning grazing on peanuts outside the kitchen window. Its mate is down on the rose arch drilling for insects in the old wood. Who else is here?



Sparrows both Tree and House and on the ground the Dunnock, Robin, Wren and Blackbird. However, the star this morning and having arrived at the weekend 18th November, has been a Brambling. Uncommon visitor in these parts. At first we thought it was a Stonechat and then possibly a Winchat perhaps a Redstart, it has a white rump and a very orange chest and we also noted a pale yellowish bill normally associated to the female of the Brambling species. Therefore look out for this pretty chaffinch sized bird.

The Siskins are back, just two females, one with white feet possibly a fungus which may need to be researched but if anyone sees this phenomena on any birds let me know as I have seen it on Chaffinches last year. May try to catch this one for veterinary examination. May need to find a licensed bird ringer for the job?

Not sighted in the garden but nearby a Barn Owl quartering the Recreation Ground on Thursday evening at dusk.

A mature visiting Red Leg Partridge avoiding the guns - wise bird now clearing up after the Collared Doves and Wood Pigeons at the bottom of our bird feeder. Jackdaws on the roof.

My first sighting of Redwings roosting in the Ash tree at the bottom of the garden, guess they have probably been and gone as there are no Berries left on the Holly Tree by Search Light Pond or Hawthorn berries by the Recreation ground.

We have had a house guest, a very large Buff Tailed Bumble Bee. At this time of the year they are the survivors from the late summer and possible a fertilised brood Queen. The fertilised Queen Bumble Bee is the only Bumble Bee to over winter. She has gone now and will have probably found a home in an old nest somewhere nearby.

A very large Hedgehog on the front door step one week ago, at the same time two plump juvenile hedgehogs in the back garden hopefully they are hibernating now in the ready hide made quarters under the ash tree at the bottom of the garden.

Hare, spotted in the autumn sown field behind us this morning. Lone Grey Squirrel looking for food this morning.

Lots going on.

Parish Council November 2017

Action Plan Local Economy and Tourism-Village Shop - Reviewing the consultation results, the representation heard and received from parishioners at the previous meeting and included in its thoughts the correspondence received and noted under correspondence item 25 on the Agenda at the Parish council meeting on the 14th November 2017. It was agreed that the way forward in supporting the Village Shop, which the Council will consider within its yearly grant applications, any application received from the Village Shop on a yearly basis. It was felt that as the policy for all grant applications requires that the below is fulfilled and that any application would be fully investigated and discussed in the public domain by the elected representatives within the Community.

In addition to the application form organisations will be required to provide the following supporting information:

- · A copy of their written constitution or details of their aims and purpose
- · Full details of the project or activity
- Demonstration that the grant will be of benefit to the local community within the Parish
- The proportion or number of beneficiaries living in the electoral area
- Demonstration of a clear need for the funding,
- A copy of the previous year's accounts or, for new initiatives, a detailed budget and business plan.

Speed Indicator Device - The Speed Indicator Device has been ordered. The supplier had confirmed that the order will take up to 6 weeks to arrive and had sent the proforma invoice. It was agreed that the Risk Assessment needed to be compiled and a rota for the Speed Indicator Device movements needed to be planned on the Calendar of works required within the parish. It was agreed that Vice Chairman Councillor Patrick Nixon, Councillor Simon Wager and the clerk would work on the project. Councillor Melvyn Thomas would be kept informed as although it had been agreed that he would be part of the Working Group, he was unavailable at present.

Highways - If any Parishioner sees or is aware of anything which they feel needs attention in and around the parish highways, they are requested to contact Wiltshire Council using either the online website above, the Wiltshire Council App or on the landline number **0300 456 0105**.

Village Design Statement – The Parish Council are looking at the need for an understanding of existing design and character in the village to properly guide future development. It is looking at creating a Village Design Statement.

Village Design Statements (VDSs) are an early precursor to parish plans and ultimately, Neighbourhood Development Plans (NDPs), and date from the 1990s. Wiltshire Council's (WC's) website contains information and advice about the production of VDSs and indicates that, once completed, they may become material planning considerations.

Once approved by A Council, village design statements will become material planning considerations. This means that they are a consideration which the council must take into account when determining planning applications. (WC website)


Wiltshire Council's website recommends the use of the documents "VILLAGE DESIGN making local character count in new development Part 1" (Countryside Commission 1996) as the starting point for the preparation of a VDS. This document states that:

An effective Village Design Statement:

- is developed, researched, written and edited by local people;
- is representative of the views of the village as a whole;
- has involved a wide section of the village community in its production;
- describes the visual character of the village;



- demonstrates how local character and distinctiveness can be protected and enhanced in new development;
- is compatible with the statutory planning system and the local planning context;
- is suitable for approval as supplementary planning guidance;
- is applicable to all forms and scale of development; and
- is about managing change in the village, not preventing it.



The Parish Council are seeking Volunteer Community Representatives to indicate if they would be interested in being part of the process to compile such a Village Design Statement. If Representatives come forward and it is agreed by the Parish Council to proceed, the final report would be sent to all relevant stakeholders and villagers before it is adopted in order to meet WC's expectations that the VDS represents community views.

Please contact the clerk by email or letter stating your interest contact details for the clerk can be found at the bottom of this article or you can make contact online from the Parish Council website.

Items for the next Agenda: Quality Gold Scheme Application (the clerk ran out of available hours to action the work required due to the extra Village Shop Consultation meeting), Councillor Patrick Nixon to action an Internal Audit check, Reserves and Contingency, General Reserves and Budget/Precept.

Date of the next meeting- The Council agreed that Tuesday 12th December 2017 would be the date of the next Parish Council meeting.

As always, the Parish Council meeting will be open at the start with an opportunity for members of the public to ask questions or make comments on any matter. The website www.maidenbradley.org.uk can be accessed to read a copy of the Agenda and Minutes electronically or copies are displayed on the Community Notice Board at the Village Hall and Bus Stop.


