Maiden Bradley Village Shop

The Committee members are deeply saddened by the closure of the shop. We were presented with the December accounts on 8 January which showed extremely poor sales. We immediately sought professional advice and were advised that we had to cease trading straightaway. To continue would have been illegal. The bad December sales were a shock and disappointment to us as we had expected a buoyant December to see us through the lean months of January and February.

The shop has been struggling to stay afloat for the last 5 years and as all of you know who were at the AGM and Shop Meeting last March the financial position was extremely precarious then. Elaine gave an excellent power point presentation which demonstrated clearly how increasing customer sales would be essential to the survival of the shop. As a result of the meeting the shop received some generous donations to help it through the crisis. The shop also embarked on fundraising activities. These measures helped to keep the shop going but the needed increase in customer sales did not materialise which meant that we were quickly going under again.

Sue and the committee worked very hard to find a solution. The passing trade increased thanks to the newly donated signs. However the average spend of these customers was not sufficient. We needed solid village support. The closure of the Post Office might have lost us some custom but in fact the Shop was on the point of closure several times over the past few years even with the Post Office. The Committees over the last 5 years have often used the slogan 'Use it or lose it'. We were also facing a volunteer shortage and volunteers have been crucial to the success of the community shop since its beginning in 2001.

I will finish by thanking profusely all the dedicated volunteers who have worked so hard and loyally in the shop- some of them since its beginning. It is heart-breaking for them to see the shop close. I would also like to thank the present committee members who have worked very hard to keep the shop open and committee members from the past who also gave time and commitment. Thank you to all the Managers past and present. Sue with the help of her husband, Richard, tried hard to make it work and gave a lot of their own time.

To all the loyal customers in the village who supported the shop and especially to those who really needed the shop I am very sorry.

Traffic action plan for Maiden Bradley



Iln October and November two cars have been wrecked by trucks passing through Maiden Bradley. Our infrastructure is unable to accommodate the density of traffic – and especially the large trucks - passing through the village. The situation has become unacceptable.

Mr and Mrs Andrew Freeman have lost two cars to truck damage. When their car was destroyed in October their children were just nearby, entering the house. Every day villagers watch vehicles climbing the pavements to allow other traffic to pass, while excessive speed is normal. There are countless stories of car wing mirrors being ripped off.

To address the traffic crisis, the parish council is promoting measures to slow down vehicles passing through the village and to collect evidence of violations. These measures will only succeed with the active support of village residents.

- 1. A Speed Indication Device (SID) will be placed alternately at 2 sites in the village. The device will alert cars to their speed in the village after entering from either North or South on the B3092.
- We aim to restart the Community Speedwatch Team with volunteers monitoring traffic speed with a speed camera and reporting speeders to the police.
- Villagers are encouraged to photograph and report incidents, ranging from damage to vehicles or property, to speeding or dangerous driving.

By collecting systematic evidence of traffic violations we aim to convince the Wiltshire Council, Highways England and the Road Haulage Association that action must be taken to prioritize the safety of our community. That means traffic calming measures and enforcing the weight restriction.

all of the following:

Enforcement of the weight restriction, agreed by Wiltshire Council, is on hold until Highways England rebuilds the A350 exit to the A303 at Willoughby Hedge. In short, lives are being put at risk in Maiden Bradley because the alternative is also deemed unsafe. This is not a solution.

It is only a matter of time before someone is injured. We do not want that to happen – that is why all of us are being asked to do our bit, by being vigilant and monitoring and reporting incidents. If you can give up a few hours here or there, it would be great if you could also volunteer to help with the SIDs or Community Speedwatch Team.

Parish Council January 2018

Speed Indicator Device - Parishioners will have noticed the Speed Indicator Device is now in place. The Parish Council has agreed the site rotation it will be placed on and it will provisionally be set as the below:

17-24 January 2018 Frome Road, 31 Jan -7 February 2018 Orchard and 14-21 February 2018 Frome Road.

Litter Pick –The Community Litter pick will be held on the **24th March 2018** and start at the **Village Hall at 10.00am**. Councillor Simon Wager will be present to hand out equipment and note areas parishioners would like to clear.

It was agreed that if Dog Walkers wished to borrow equipment on a regular basis before this date they could, do contact Councillor Simon Wager if you would be interesting in borrowing some equipment and actioning adhoc litter picking to help enhance the appearance of the parish.

Precept – The Parish Council have agreed the Precept Balancing Figure of £15,730.08 for the financial year April 2018 to April 2019. This would mean an increase of £11.93 in total for a year as the Parish Councils proportion of the Council Tax on a Band D property. This would allow the Parish Council to retain the defibrillator refurbish the play area equipment further and support all the projects it wishes to complete in 2018/2019. Parishioners are asked to note that this would give the Parish Council £1388.32 extra to spend in the financial 2018/2019 year to balance the requirements of the Parish Council.

Items for the next Agenda: Local Councils Award Scheme, Policy updating and Register of Interests update.

Date of the next meeting- The Council agreed that Tuesday 13th February 2018 would be the date of the next Parish Council meeting.

As always, the Parish Council meeting will be open at the start with an opportunity for members of the public to ask questions or make comments on any matter. The Wylye Way

The Wylye Way is a 32 mile walkers' route which links two of Wiltshire's great estates. Stourhead and Wilton. The headwaters of the River Wylye rise on the National Trust's Stourhead estate and the route follows the river to its confluence with the River Nadder in the grounds of the Earl of Pembroke's Wilton House. The walk is divided into 7 short sections (min 3.5 miles – max 5.5 miles) and leads walkers over some delightful downland countryside as well as walking close by the river. The route uses age old trackways, bridleways and footpaths which connect quiet thatched villages, most with ancient churches and pubs.

At Easter this year we are going to start the first section of this walk and continue twice a month until all 7 sections have been accomplished. If you would like to join us on this route for some or all of the sections, please get in

- 50g/13/4oz porridge oats
- 2 apples, coarsely grated
- 20g/3/40z blanched hazelnuts, roughly chopped
- 1/4 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp ground nutmeg
- 200g/7oz 0% fat Greek yoghurt
- 100ml/31/2fl oz skimmed milk
- 100q/3½oz blueberries
- 10g/1/4oz flaked almonds, toasted



- In a bowl mix the oats, apples, hazelnuts, cinnamon and nutmeg. Stir in the yoghurt and milk, then cover the bowl and chill in the fridge for several hours or overnight.
 - 2. Spoon into two bowls and top with the blueberries and almonds.

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




