## POPPY APPEAL

The Royal British Legion created the Poppy Appeal to help those returning from the First World War. This year we are commemorating 100 years since the end of this conflict. The Legion has been marking this centenary by launching a movement to say "Thank You" to the First World War generation who served, sacrificed and changed our world. As Sir Michael Morpurgo, a "Thank You Ambassador, said "To the farmers who gave up their horses to the war effort; to the women who kept our home fires burning; to the Sassoons and the Macraes whose work has shaped our understanding of conflict; we should indeed say 'Thank You."

For others it is for relatives who fought and came home, or didn't come home at all.

Today the British Legion are still helping today's Armed Forces families in much the same way, whether coping with bereavement, living with disability, or finding employment. Your contribution can make an enormous difference.

The house to house collections are licensed to start on 27th October and will continue until 10th November.. Those kindly collecting are David Morse (High Street, Frome View), Mary Stevens (The Knapp, Barcroft, the Rank and Frome Road), Diana Stevens (Church Street Somerset Arms side), Sarah Neish (church Street, outlying Farms). There will be static points in the Village Hall and the Somerset Arms. Lt Col Alex Haig will also be helping out this year.

## Autumn in the Rank

Well autumn has arrived and the promise of an Indian Summer may just be a pipe dream. The Swifts left us early this year and were gone by 6<sup>th</sup> August however they seem to have a good season and reared several clutches in the roofs and swift boxes of the houses in The Rank and in Church Street. They need to nest 5 to 6 metres above the ground, this allows the fledglings to fall out of the nest spread their wings and take to the air for the rest of their lives. Looking forward to 9<sup>th</sup> May next year when they may return. The House Martins fewer in number this year have already flown leaving early because nesting sites have been at a premium this year and the lack of puddles and muddy patches to provide the materials to mix up a pug to build a new nest. Please don't knock old nests down, leave them for next season let the birds repair them.

Swallows, at the time of writing, are still here - first to come last to go. Swallows are known to overwinter occasionally because of abundant insects in our mild climate, worthwhile keeping an eye open during the winter months you never know.

Now who heard the Cuckoo in late July and throughout August? Three people have mentioned this to me and I just ignored them and smiled. Until I heard what sounded like a Cuckoo with a continuous call, not just one bird calling but two possibly three. Cuckoos are solitary birds, they are larger birds with scimitar shaped wings and quite visible during the spring and vocal on arrival. This late summer caller, what have we got something unusual perhaps that's for sure. With a little help from the RSPB it is possible we have had a visit from Hoopoes moving north from parched Europe where temperatures soared to 35° C + and food was scarce. I have seen Hoopoes in Spain and France and a charming exotic looking bird. However no sightings here, unless you saw and heard one. If you follow the link on your computer you can hear them and see a hoopoe; let us know if you have seem one locally.

What else is about, sightings of Pole Cats in Bradley Lane and Hedgehogs in the Gardens of the Rank, please encourage habitat for these mammals they like a bit of Cat food please don't use slug bait it is harmful to the Hedgehog. Help them and they will clear out that garden pest, try to allow a pathway between gardens. Likewise avoid using grain impregnated with Rat Poison as this not helpful to ground feeding birds. Nesting box produced three only Blue Tit chicks this year. Barn Owl spotted quartering the Recreation ground early evening in late August.

Since being founded in 2001 by Nick Andrew, the biennial Wylye Valley Art Trail has established itself as the largest visual arts event in Wiltshire and has raised the cultural profile of this part of the county. The trail is now co-ordinated by Laura Rich and a team of volunteers. Last year there were 73 venues, scattered across some of the most beautiful countryside this county has to offer. A wide and eclectic patchwork of art and craft from over 300 participants, ranging from award- winning artists with international reputations to others only just starting out on their creative paths.

The Wylye Valley Art Trail is set in southwest Wiltshire, covering Warminster, Westbury, Wylye, Maiden Bradley, Mere, Hindon, Tisbury and villages between. Visit open studios and workplaces, galleries, exhibitions by art groups, student groups and other exciting events including 'hands on' activities, demonstrations, workshops and talks. A unique opportunity to see the high standard of visual arts and crafts currently being carried out in the area, across a wide range of skills, from painting to print- making, furniture making to photography and sculpture to ceramics. It offers the chance to meet the artists and, in many cases, see where and how they work.

Next year we are celebrating the 10th Wylye Valley Art Trail for 10 days from Saturday 18 until Monday 27 May 2019. We would like to make it more inspiring, more memorable, and even more special! A vibrant festival of visual art excellence!

So we want to send out an invitation to artists, craftspeople and groups to take part. Maybe those who are new to the area, just out of art college or have been considering participating for a while. The art trail is open to any artist who lives, works or has a strong interest or connection with this area. So we would be grateful for your help in spreading this invitation. We are also searching for possible venues for exhibitions.

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
